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





- 1. Understand the nature, components of an ecosystem and that humans are an integral part of nature.
- 2. Realize the importance of environment, the goods and services of a healthy biodiversity, dependence of humans on environment.
- 3. Evaluate the ways and ill effects of destruction of environment, population explosion on ecosystems and global problems consequent to anthropogenic activities.
- 4. Discuss the laws/ acts made by government to prevent pollution, to protect biodiversity and environment as a whole.
- 5. Acquaint with international agreements and national movements, and realize citizen's role in protecting environment and nature.

Unit-1: Environment and Natural Resources

- 1. Multidisciplinary nature of environmental education; scope and importance.
- 2. Man as an integral product and part of the Nature.
- 3. A brief account of land, forest and water resources in India and their importance.
- 4. Biodiversity: Definition; importance of Biodiversity ecological, consumptive, productive, social, ethical and moral, aesthetic, and option value.
- 5. Levels of Biodiversity: Genetic, species and ecosystem diversity.

Unit-2: Environmental Degradation and Impacts

- 1. Human population growth and its impacts on environment; land use change, land degradation, soil erosion and desertification.
- 2. Use and over-exploitation of surface and ground water, construction of dams, floods, conflicts over water (within India).
- 3. **Deforestation:** Causes and effects due to expansion of agriculture, firewood, mining, forest fires and building of new habitats.
- 4. Non-renewable energy resources, their utilization and influences.
- 5. A brief account of air, water, soil and noise pollutions; Biological, industrial and solid wastes in urban areas. Human health and economic risks.
- 6. Green house effect global warming; ocean acidification, ozone layer depletion, acid rains and impacts on human communities and agriculture.

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7. Threats to biodiversity: Natural calamities, habitat destruction and fragmentation, over exploitation, hunting and poaching, introduction of exotic species, pollution, predator and pest control.

Unit-3: Conservation of Environment

- 1. Concept of sustainability and sustainable development with judicious use of land, water and forest resources; afforestation.
- 2. Control measures for various types of pollution; use of renewable and alternate sources of energy.
- 3. Solid waste management: Control measures of urban and industrial waste.
- **4. Conservation of biodiversity:** In-situ and ex-situ conservation of biodiversity.
